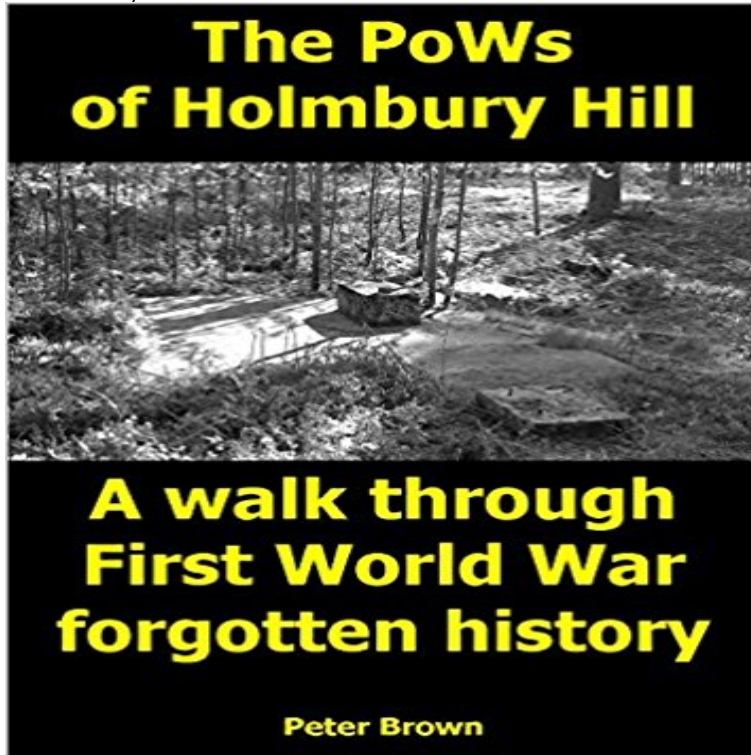


The PoWs of Holmbury Hill: A walk through First World War forgotten history
